- Nova Scotia Gaels are a people whose language is Gaelic.
- Gaelic is a group of languages spoken in Nova Scotia, Scotland, Ireland, and the Isle of Man.
- In the 1700s and 1800s, many people from the Scottish Highlands settled in Nova Scotia.
- So many Gaels settled here that, at one point, they represented a quarter of Nova Scotia's population.
- Today, one-third of Nova Scotians are descended from these Gaels. While not all speak the language, Gaelic cultural heritage and identity continue to be vibrant elements of Nova Scotia life.
